President's Report

Reflecting on what was a busy and challenging year for the first New Zealand Agricultural Show - one of the standout memories for me will always be just how unbelievably lucky we were with the weather. With the weeks leading up to, and after the show, very unseasonal - to say the least.

I have no doubt that the weather helped attract great numbers through the gate on the Wednesday and Thursday and while those may have detracted from Friday's crowd size - competition was still fierce in the show ring

The 2018 committee and executive dealt with a number of challenges and changes which I believe will see the show heading in the right direction. The introduction of the new brand and name - The New Zealand Agricultural Show - was controversial but in my mind a great step forward.

As many dealt with the fallout of the M. Bovis outbreak, we were overwhelmed by the support from the cattle section entrants. Thank you to all involved who worked tirelessly to make sure the section was a fantastic success.

Once again, the standard of exhibits was exceptional and bolstered by good entry numbers in most sections and record numbers in the Clydesdales and pigs - the judges had their work cut out. I would like to take the opportunity to personally thank all judges and stewards for their expertise and dedication to the Show.

Congratulations to the Van Asch family, of Marlborough, who won Supreme Exhibit with their 9-year-old South Devon Cow with calf at foot, Doug Bain who won the show legend and a legend he is in the poultry section and also Lesley Lewis who won the Dakins Ambassador of the year award. Lesley and her running of the shetland steeplechase has long been a crowd favourite and never fails to entertain.

Geoff Bone, and his team at Beck and Caul, once again ran a fantastic show and I wish to thank them all. I would also like to make special mention and thank Dugald and Jonathan for all of their work on the grounds, under trying circumstances the grounds looked great and worked well.

There were a few disappointments and areas we can improve on. Traffic management on the Wednesday was an issue but ran very well for the following two days. We encountered problems with our new computer system which direct credits prize money - these are being addressed and I am very sorry for any inconvenience. Despite three fine days, and good entries and gate numbers, the show is still struggling to be profitable due to ever-increasing compliance costs. This is an area which needs to be addressed and going forward I am hopeful we can build a closer relationship with the Christchurch City Council and ChchNZ to overcome these challenges together. The Show is an integral part

of the annual Christchurch Anniversary week event programme and can be grown.

As I walked around the Show during the three days, the importance of the newly named Hazlett City Farmyard was reiterated to me. Watching children interact with and learn about animals - many for the first time - it was clear to me just how important this popular section is. It may seem foreign to most members, but for many Cantabrian children - the Show is the first step in what could be a lifelong association with animals - and potentially a future in our agricultural sector.

If the speakers and exhibitors within the new Blink Innovation Hub tent are anything to go by - that future is bright. I certainly enjoyed listening to the insightful speakers with inspirational views and believe this is an important offering at the Show.

The Boar Breeders have continued to grow their section and must be commended for the work they are doing to attract new exhibitors to the show. They bring an entertaining element to their competition and can lay claim to having the fastest growing section.

Another personal highlight for me was having the wool auction return for the 3rd consecutive year. It really is quite something to watch several million dollars passing under the hammer at the show.

It was also fantastic to see the polo back in the main ring again this year and if the feedback is anything to go by - we need to continue to host this, and other crowd pleasers, centre stage.

I enjoyed spending time with Members, exhibitors, distinguished guests and friends throughout the Show - it is the chance to catch up with old friends and make new ones that makes the Show such a special event.

A big thank you to all past presidents, Committee, sub Committee, Members, Board and staff, it has been a pleasure to work alongside some fantastic, passionate and enthusiastic people.

Thank you to my parents, Bryce and Vicki, for their longstanding involvement in the Show and support during my presidency. To my wife, Brooke, thank you for all of your help behind the scenes. And thank you to my daughters, Lucy and Alex, who will hopefully continue the family involvement with this great organisation.

I would also like to thank 2018 Vice Presidents Chris Herbert and Chris Harris for all their help and I wish them both all the very best for the 2019 Show.

It's been a huge honour and privilege being your President for the past year and I look forward to being part of the best show in New Zealand well into the future.

Chairman's Report

- Another successful Show
- Great weather
- Huge contribution by our Committee and volunteers
- But increasing challenges ahead that need to be resolved.

2018 was in many ways a very successful and rewarding year for the Board and the 'business'. Plenty of exciting change and challenges, many of which the management team met head-on, and found satisfactory resolutions too. Some were of our own making (eg, the rebranding) and some were thrust upon us (eg, bovis and increasing Health & Safety compliance issues). We have an iconic, historic, and yet contemporary business, that must not only survive but thrive. I am conscious that the financial 'hand to mouth' existence, puts a lot of strain and pressure on our Event Management team and the Committee and our volunteers. We must find answers that underpin a much more sustainable business model, and ensure growth and security.

As you are all aware, we are 'inextricably bound at the hip' with the Christchurch City Council, who control, oversee and/or influence much of our infrastructural and Show decision making. The Board has not been happy with the efficacy of this relationship and has initiated high-level meetings with the Mayor, councillors and Executive Management to expedite resolution to these outstanding matters. Among these, the impact of the Nga Puna Wai development has been significant, absorbing already stretched management time and physically impacting on our car parking facilities. This is a major issue which we are trying to resolve with CCC, including exploring the options for increased public transport services.

We are also trying to bring to fruition an acceptable Park Management contract. We have been in dialogue with the Council, on this, for a number of years now. We must achieve greater compensation for our operational team's time.

The Rates remission issue, also with Council, remains unresolved at the present time, but we are bringing increasing pressure, to hopefully achieve a positive result.

Health & Safety compliance is an ever increasing, and necessary focus for the Show, and also for the wider Park facility. Again we are trying to make progress with the Council on an acceptable split of responsibilities in this regard.

We have also held meetings with ECAN (transport) and ChristchurchNZ (funding) to facilitate ongoing progress and positive change.

We believe the rebranding has been a success but will require ongoing reinforcement, particularly at a political and international level. Publically, I am sure the A&P brand will remain top of mind for quite some time, and I see that as no bad thing. We need to leverage both, as and when necessary.

We continue to work with the Canterbury Saleyards company to explore wider industry use of the building facilities during the year. I believe we are making slow, but steady progress in what is a very complex and challenging matter.

As you can see, both the management team and board have a lot on our plates, outside of the Show itself. Our business model and fragile funding base continue to be at considerable risk. To that end we have set ourselves a challenge to increase revenues by approximately 20% by the end of next year – hence the mission "\$3m by 2021". This will be highly dependent on leveraging our new brand with Central Government funding bodies and implementing some new revenue initiatives, that will require council support and consent eg, park naming rights, billboard signage and the Wigram Road development.

I am acutely conscious of ongoing discussions and requirements for better administrative and storage facilities for the Committee and volunteers. These infrastructural requirements have not escaped the board's thinking, but will be heavily dependent on greater funding success and/or developments, potentially in conjunction with other sporting bodies. Again, I also want to acknowledge the extraordinary contribution and effort of our Committee, expertly led by Tim Black, and also the associated subcommittees and volunteers. In a world that is increasingly challenged for volunteer time, I believe our people stand out as a role model of community effort and success.

I wish to acknowledge our sponsors, trade clients and exhibitors. We don't take you for granted and value your ongoing contribution, for many of you, year in year out.

Event Directors' Report

2018 saw the biggest year for the Show yet, as we moved forward under the new name of the New Zealand Agricultural Show. Thanks to the commitment and the hard work of our volunteers, Members, operations team and committees this colossal task was carried out to an impressive standard. Although we still have a way to go with reinforcing our new brand and conveying our message, we are proud of where we are and all those who have been involved.

The Show continues to face considerable challenges to visitor experience, imposed upon us through the council's developments of Nga Puna Wai having devastating impact on our car park offering and overall reputation. This is something I will continue to work hard on alleviating this year, in order to reinstate faith of a great family day out for Christchurch locals. Along with our focus on aiming to improve the parking situation, we will also look at overall visitor experience and engagement with the activities on offer at the Show. Current options being explored include an app, digital signage and upgrading the family entertainment offering.

The Show faced another dose of adversity in the form of *Mycoplasma bovis*. I am extremely proud of the hard work and dedication put in by Anne Rogers, the wider cattle committee and many others to ensure our cattle section was able to progress. The updated biosecurity processes that were implemented proved the extent of this work and will position the Show in good stead to deal with future biosecurity adversities, should they arise.

The tricky year has been reflected in our financials, with a loss of \$46,029 delivered after depreciation. We delivered a pre depreciation surplus of \$57,172, proving we must look at ways of making the Show more financially sustainable to combat adversities.

2018 saw the next stage of our innovation offering at the Show, with the introduction of the Blinc Innovation Hub progressing with full force. The Hub hosted a variety of seminars covering Canterbury Farming & Food Production in 2030, New Innovation Platforms for On-Farm Decision Support & Managing Biosecurity is Critical to Our Future. The hub also welcomed an array of innovative companies, some more established

and some startups. We aim to build this offering as a highly anticipated event each year and hope to secure funding and push out the series to a far wider audience for 2019.

We spent a considerable portion of the budget in 2018 on establishing the rebrand and ensuring all Show material was cohesive. This year, focus will be on reiterating the new brand an ensuring awareness on the reasoning behind it. Positioning ourselves as leaders in the field of communicating innovation in agriculture will be a prominent pillar of this establishment and a focus for growth this year.

We again received considerable support from a number of sponsors including ChristchurchNZ, Tip Top, ASB, VERO and many more. As our new brand continues to develop, we hope too that the value of the Show to sponsors will increase and valued partnerships, such as those held with the aforementioned, will also increase.

I must also extend a thank you and my appreciation to my Beck and Caul team, who again worked tirelessly to pull off a fantastic Show. The 2018 Show was certainly not without its challenges, and everyone banded together to ensure everything ran as seamlessly as possible and their hard work resulted in a fantastic event.

I would also like to extend a thank you to our General Committee and President, Tim Black. Tim certainly made 2018 one to remember with the levels of fun and overall atmosphere of the Show at an all-time high. Your commitment was commendable and it was a pleasure working with you. It is a testament to the quality of elected General Committee members and Elected Board members that we have such a cohesive and productive management environment.

With the planning for this year's Show already well underway, I am excited for what 2019 holds for us and look forward to working with you all to make it a fun and successful Show all round.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 December 2018

Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

The Canterbury Agricultural & Pastoral Association is a Society governed by the Agricultural & Pastoral Societies Act 1908.

Canterbury Agricultural & Pastoral Association is registered as a Charitable Entity under the Charities Act 2005, Registration Number CC39172.

Note 2 - Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation

The financial statement have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand. They comply with the PBE Accounting Standards as appropriate for Tier two not-for-profit benefit entities. As a registered charity, The Canterbury Agricultural and Pastoral Society is required to prepare financial statements in accordance with NZ GAAP as specified in standard XRB A1. The Association is a Tier Two reporting entity as it has expenditure less than \$30m and greater than \$2m.

Measurement Base

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost except for the following material items in the statement of financial position:

- Buildings are stated at valuation
- Livestock is measured at market value

These financial statements are presented in New Zealand Dollars (\$), which is the Association's functional currency. All amounts have been rounded to the nearest dollar, unless otherwise indicated.

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Note 3 - Specific Accounting Policies

a) Depreciation & Amortisation

Depreciation has been charged on the basis of cost or valuation, at rates based on the expected economic life of the asset.

The following rates have been used:

Buildings	2 - 6% S L
Furniture & Fittings	8 - 40% DV
Office Equipment	10 - 67% DV
Plant & Machinery	2 - 67% DV
Motor Vehicles	10 - 30% DV

The depreciable amount of an intangible asset with a finite useful life shall be allocated on a systematic basis over its useful life.

The following rates have been used:

b) Valuation of Property, Plant & Equipment

Land and buildings (not including the Saleyards Land and buildings (not including the Saleyards buildings),

are included at depreciated replacement cost, due to the specialised nature of buildings. Other assets are stated at cost less depreciation to date. Property, plant & equipment are written down immediately if an impairment in the value of the asset causes the recoverable amount to fall below carrying amount.

c) Trade Debtors

Trade debtors are valued at net realisable value after due allowance for doubtful debts.

d) Leases

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance on a basis representative of the pattern of benefits expected to be derived from the leased assets.

1. On the November 2017, the Association renewed the lease with Canterbury Sale Yards (1996) Limited for a second term. Under the lease renewal document a number of key terms were changed, as now Canterbury Saleyards (1996) Limited will pay all outgoings going forward.

- Canterbury Sale Yards (1996) Limited has the right to claim nine rights of renewal, each for 20 years – potentially a further 180 years.
- In the event that the lease is not renewed, all ownership and occupancy benefits and costs revert to the Association.

2018 key terms

- Beyond 2017 and for so long as Canterbury Sale Yards (1996) Limited has renewed its lease, rentals shall be zero. Canterbury Sale Yards (1996) Limited assumes responsibility for all outgoings including repairs and maintenance, property expenses, etc., subject only to an apportionment based on the availability of the premises to the Association.

2017 key terms

- Certain expenses designated as property expenses are the responsibility of the Association through to the year 2017, up to a limit of \$40,000 plus GST per annum. Any amounts over this are reimbursed by Canterbury Sale Yards (1996) Limited.
- In the 2017 financial year and earlier, the rental for the premises was an amount equal to the principal from BNZ bank. As these loans were extinguished

2. Saleyards Lease

The Saleyards lease meets the definition of a "Finance Lease" under Accounting Standards. The Standard requires that the economic substance of the transaction be reported in the accounts, rather than emphasising the legal ownership. The Association's gross investment in finance leases and the amount of unearned finance income has not been disclosed, as it cannot be calculated owing to the variable nature of the payments.

The unguaranteed residual value of the leased assets cannot be calculated because the potential length of the lease including all available renewal terms cannot be ascertained.

e) Valuation of Livestock

Livestock has been valued using market value.

f) Income Taxation

The entity is exempt from income taxation.

g) Revenue from exchange and non-exchange transactions

Revenue from exchange transactions

Service

Revenue from services rendered is recognised in the statement of financial performance when the service is provided.

Sales of goods

Revenue is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the customer, recovery of the consideration is probable, the associated costs and possible return of goods can be estimated reliably, there is no continuing management involvement with the goods, and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably. Revenue is measured net of returns and trade discounts.

Interest income

Interest income is earned for the use of cash and cash equivalents or any amounts due to the Association.

Interest income is recognised in the statement of financial performance as it is earned. Interest income is accrued using the effective interest rate method.

The effective interest rate exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial assets to that asset's net carrying amount. The method applies this rate to the principal outstanding to determine interest revenue each period.

Revenue from exchange Transactions

Non-exchange Revenue

Non-exchange transactions are those where the Association receives value from another entity (e.g. cash or other assets) without giving approximately equal value in exchange.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions, other than services in-kind, that meet the definition of an asset are recognised as an asset only when:

- It is probable that the Association will receive an inflow of economic benefits or service potential; and
 - The fair value of can be measured reliably.
- Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.
- Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:
- It is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
 - The amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.

The following are the specific recognition criteria in relation to the Associations non-exchange transactions.

Grants and donations

Payments received under grants are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance upon fulfilment of terms and conditions attached to each individual grant.

Donated Services

The Association sometimes receives the donated services from volunteers. The Association has elected not to recognise these services as they are difficult to measure reliability.

h) Related parties

The association regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exert control individually or jointly, or to exercise significant influence over the Association, or vice versa. Members of key management are regarded as related parties and comprise the directors of the Association.

The Association has operating lease commitments for a Ricoh photocopier and Isuzu damo.

In 2016 The Association entered into a 5 year fixed lease with Ricoh for \$43,200.

In 2001 the Christchurch City Council acquired the Canterbury Agricultural Park land. The Association has entered into a license for 100 years from 1 April 2001 with the Christchurch City Council to occupy 90.14 hectares of that land for one month in each year. The Association has also entered into a lease for 20 years from 1 July 2001 with the Christchurch City Council with respect to 2.03 hectares of that land. The rental cost of the land is based on the actual costs incurred for that year.
